God's Big Picture 6: Exile and Return

To consider before we start...

What are the most important things you have learnt or discovered as a result of doing this Lent course?

What are the biggest questions which this course has not yet answered?

A key theme of this course has been to see the ways in which Jesus fulfils all the promises of the Old Testament. This is also the theme of the New Testament book of Hebrews, which begins in this way:

Hebrews 1:1-5a

New International Version

¹ In the past God spoke to our ancestors through the prophets at many times and in various ways, ² but in these last days he has spoken to us by his Son, whom he appointed heir of all things, and through whom also he made the universe. ³ The Son is the radiance of God's glory and the exact representation of his being, sustaining all things by his powerful word. After he had provided purification for sins, he sat down at the right hand of the Majesty in heaven. ⁴ So he became as much superior to the angels as the name he has inherited is superior to theirs.

⁵ For to which of the angels did God ever say, 'You are my Son; today I have become your Father' [Psalm 2:7]?

The final verse includes a quotation from Psalm 2. How many *other* Old Testament books, events and themes can you find referred to in these verses?



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Bible passages for reflection and discussion

2 Kings 17:5-14

New International Version

⁵The king of Assyria invaded the entire land, marched against Samaria and laid siege to it for three years. ⁶In the ninth year of Hoshea, the king of Assyria captured Samaria and deported the Israelites to Assyria. He settled them in Halah, in Gozan on the River Habor and in the towns of the Medes.

⁷ All this took place because the Israelites had sinned against the LORD their God, who had brought them up out of Egypt from under the power of Pharaoh king of Egypt. They worshipped other gods ⁸ and followed the practices of the nations the LORD had driven out before them, as well as the practices that the kings of Israel had introduced. ⁹ The Israelites secretly did things against the LORD their God that were not right. From watch-tower to fortified city they built themselves high places in all their towns. ¹⁰ They set up sacred stones and Asherah poles on every high hill and under every spreading tree. ¹¹ At every high place they burned incense, as the nations whom the LORD had driven out before them had done. They did wicked things that aroused the LORD's anger. ¹² They worshipped idols, though the LORD had said, 'You shall not do this.' ¹³ The LORD warned Israel and Judah through all his prophets and seers: 'Turn from your evil ways. Observe my commands and decrees, in accordance with the entire Law that I commanded your ancestors to obey and that I delivered to you through my servants the prophets.'

¹⁴ But they would not listen and were as stiff-necked as their ancestors, who did not trust in the LORD their God.

Consider what we learn from this passage about:

- 1. The character of God's people
- 2. The justice of God
- 3. The role of the prophets

¹¹ With praise and thanksgiving they sang to the LORD:

'He is good;
his love towards Israel endures for ever.'

And all the people gave a great shout of praise to the LORD, because the foundation of the house of the LORD was laid. ¹² But many of the older priests and Levites and family heads, who had seen the former temple, wept aloud when they saw the foundation of this temple being laid, while many others shouted for joy. ¹³ No one could distinguish the sound of the shouts of joy from the sound of weeping, because the people made so much noise. And the sound was heard far away.

Consider the following questions:

- 1. What was encouraging and discouraging about the foundation of the second Temple?
- 2. Why might this help us to see the Old Testament as an unfinished story?

Fact File 1: The Exile and the Return

Kings fail

- Solomon's greed (1 Kings 10:26-11:3, cf Deuteronomy 17:16-19)
- The division of the kingdom: a downward spiral with very few exceptions

People sin

- God's word shows the moral inadequacy of his people (eg Amos 7:7-8)

The land is lost

- Military defeat by Babylon
- Before and after: Psalm 48 cf Psalm 137

The exile is God's judgment

- Mirrors the expulsion from Eden
- A reversal of the promise to Abraham

The return

- A new Temple
- A new heart
- An unfinished story

Fact File 2: Jesus – the present kingdom


